








ELS is a synthetic phonics programme which our school uses to help children learn to read in Reception and Key Stage 1.







Phase 3 sounds. These include digraphs, where two letters make one sound.

It is essential that the children say each sound correctly. It needs to be the pure sound with no 'er' on the end.



Once the children have learnt some sounds, we use these to read short words. The children will say each sound and then blend them together.









We also use phonics to help when writing and spelling new words.

















Reading in school...

- Phonics sessions are heavily reading focused.
- Children have lots of opportunities to read during discovery time.
- Books are grouped into colour and number bands.
- It is our intention to change their books once a week.





How can you help at home?

- Practise the sounds regularly. Even a few each day really helps.
- Read the school book at least 4 times a week.
- Practise the harder to read and spell words regularly.
- Please continue to read for pleasure! Listening to stories is so beneficial.





Benefits of listening to stories...

If a child is never read to they will have heard approximately 4,662 words by the time they are 5 years old.

If a child is read to 1-2 times per week, they will have heard approximately 63,570 words by the time they are 5 years old.

If a child is read to 3-4 times per week, they will have heard approximately 169,525 words by the time they are 5 years old.

If a child is read to daily, they will have heard approximately 296,660 words by the time they are 5 years old.

If a child is read 5 books a day, they will have heard approximately 1,483,300 words by the time they are 5 years old.

Exposure to vocabulary is good for all children. Please read them a book today!







By the end of Year R...

Comprehension

- Demonstrate understanding of what has been read to them by retelling stories and narratives using their own words and recently introduced vocabulary.
- Anticipate (where appropriate) key events in stories.
- Use and understand recently introduced vocabulary during discussions about stories, nonfiction, rhymes and poems and during role play.

Word Reading

- Say a sound for each letter in the alphabet and at least 10 digraphs.
- Read words consistent with their phonic knowledge by sound-blending.
- Read aloud simple sentences and books that are consistent with their phonic knowledge, including some common exception words.
